V2 SPRINGS INTO LIFE WITH ART, FORUMS, AND EVENTS

(Seattle, WA) – V2, the former Value Village space located in Capitol Hill, and now home to arts organizations <u>Velocity Dance Center</u> and <u>One Reel</u> and launch pad for the Capitol Hill Arts District activities, is springing to life this summer with a burst of activity and events. From forums discussing important issues to visual art exhibitions, multimedia and dance performances, V2 is opening their doors to the public to experience and participate in a variety of events that will take place at the former Value Village space-turned-arts-center starting in June.

EVENT: The Community Consent Project

WHEN: June 2, 7-9PM

The <u>Community Consent Project</u> invites the Seattle community to join us in creating art from their own experiences and exploring tools for developing healthy intimate relationships. With the consent of the creators at our event, we will be taking this art into the streets to share it with the blossoming Thursday night bar crawlers and engage the general public in the conversation, in an performance art Piece that some in our group have referred to as the Consent Crawl. *Sponsored by Capitol Hill Arts District.*

NM members NKO, Baldman, Smurf, No Touching Ground, and 179 collaborate to bring you a statement that everyone can appreciate yet no one has. Askew in its 8' 3-dimensional stature, RENT CONTROL is surrounded by overgrowth and the abstract. The Mural *Untitled*, unsure of what the future holds, transform from a full color spectrum to black and white although the topic of housing is far from that. New Mystics is a collective of creatives and thinkers engaging with the environment we all share; we create commentary on social issues in the world around us to activate conscience thought for the mass.
